Legislation Update: Henderson joins NLV. LV and unincorporated Clark County and Mesquite in passing S/N ordinance

This year continues to be a busy one for the LVVHS as it works on local ordinances and readies legislation for the upcoming 2011 State Legislative session. On June 15th, months of intensive meetings with the Animal Advisory Committee came to an end when the Clark County Commission passed a revised Title 10, which has to do with the way that animals are maintained in unincorporated Clark County. This follow up to the spay-neuter ordinance passed in January 2010 in Clark County requires a breeder's permit if people do not want to spay/neuter their animals. Only animals shown in certified national organizations' judging are qualified, and the permit must be updated every year.

In August, Henderson joined all of the other Clark County jurisdictions outside of Boulder City in passing regulated spay/neuter ordinances. LVVHS tested its new e-mail alert system, which was sent to Henderson supporters advising them of the meeting. The Council passed the ordinance 4 to 1.

A BIG THANK YOU TO JIFFY LUBE! Jiffy Lube sponsored a month-long event for the Las Vegas Valley Humane Society, during which a portion of each oil change went towards the LVVHS. The Humane Society attended a grand reopening of a Henderson store; their \$6,000 donation came at a very opportune time.

Letter from the President

The LVVHS turned in its form 990 for CY2009 recently. It showed that adoptions were slightly up in 2009—670 versus 632 in CY2008. That's good news. Hopefully, adoptions have reached their bottom and are starting upward again. Most of that is on the dog side. This summer also has seen a dramatic increase in rescues with the LVVHS often handling two and three rescues a day. Resources and volunteers are being stretched as local governments reduce their animal control staffing. The stretch of 110 temperatures also played a role: the first 110 day saw three dog rescues—all heat related. Two were successful, the last was not—mainly because of the person's inability to recognize the dog was suffering from heat stroke and a 24 hr delay in contacting us. More cats suffering from the heat are also being seen this summer—many may be former house cats left to fend for themselves. As housing foreclosures continue, the LVVHS continues to see returns from shelters and animals left behind. In one five day stretch, seven cats were returned-two from the Henderson Shelter and five from Lied Animal Shelter. In one of those instances—seen here in one of the rescue stories—it was the LVVHS original red tag from the cats adopted in 2002 that got the cats back to us.

We can't continue this work without your support. Now, more than ever, we need you to provide financial support. A local newspaper columnist commented recently that I don't receive a salary. Neither do any of our volunteersthe money you send is spent on the animals and it's all local! Check out our 990. Please come to the Fur Ball. I'll see you there.

We are the lucky ones because we unlike the people that dumped us know the true meaning of a family. Today we are happy, healthy and adopted to our forever homes.







My name is Alexus, and there's a story behind my name. At only 4 weeks old, I was found running around a parking garage, from car to car, trying to escape the scary outdoors. I was crying, but too afraid to come out. I spent the most time hiding in the engine of a Lexus, so that's how I got my name. After 15 hours, and a lot of patience, my rescuer saved me! I was shy at first, but if you pick me up I will purr and cuddle. I'm very sweet, love to play, and I get along with cats of all ages! I'm spayed, vaccinated and micro-chipped. She was adopted to a loving family within 10 days of her rescue. A true rags to riches story!





We were called about an abandoned trailer containing two LVVHS cats. What we didn't realize is that there was also a dog living underneath the trailer. He was a black lab mix with a distinguished white stripe down his neck. Our volunteers spent 2 hours at the trailer trying to get the dog to come out. They realized that every time they drove up, he would come out and bark, then run back under. So, they decided to outsmart him. They drove away and pulled back up, and one volunteer snuck around the back of the trailer and blocked his entrance to underneath the trailer as he came out to bark at the other volunteer. He then ran inside the trailer, and there was no way out, so they were able to seize him. Stripe was placed in a loving foster home where he loved to play fetch with tennis balls. He was just adopted last week!
