TRAP, NEUTER, RELEASE (TNR)Taking care of feral cats in our community

It's been a challenging year for the LVVHS TNR program. As part of our mission, we work to reduce the overpopulation of homeless cats in the community by trapping, spay/neutering, vaccinating and releasing these animals back to the areas where they were trapped. There are other rescue groups in the valley who perform these services as their primary purpose; however, with the extremely high demand, there are many requests for help that overflow to organizations such as ours. Currently we are receiving up to 10 calls a day to our hotline, asking us to assist with homeless cats who are being fed by good Samaritans all around the city.





The effects of the pandemic are still being felt well into 2021, as the progress made in this endeavor was put almost completely on hold due to lockdown and clinic closures in spring and summer of last year. Even with clinics now open for business, including our primary partner clinic for this service, Heaven Can Wait, we are still dealing with a tremendous backlog of requests for assistance. There are many steps of the process to coordinate, including assessing the trap site, performing the actual trapping, transporting cats to and from the clinic and recovering afterwards. The recovery process involves monitoring the cats for 24-48 hours after their surgery to ensure there are no complications and recovery is successful.

It is so critical to work to control the population of these animals, now more than ever since the setbacks of COVID-19 that are felt in so many ways in our community. We are so thankful to the dedicated group of volunteers who assist LVVHS with this important work. If you or

anyone you know might have the desire and opportunity to help us with this part of our mission, we would love to hear from you and have you join our volunteer team for trapping, transporting or recovering — we can show you how! Upon our arrival to pick up the three dogs, we found out the family had been using them to clean out the refrigerator and freezer. They

were fed hot dogs, hamburgers and what ever else could be found in the house.

Susie had some trouble walking and keeping her balance. We took her to a neurologist for a diagnosis and treatment. It was determined that her cerebellum had not completely formed. This malformation caused the balance and walking issues, also some head bobbing. Susie is in a loving foster home with John & Linda who are working on her exercise program to improve her strength and balance. She has improved greatly under the very watchful eye of her fosters! Susie still has some trouble eating out of a bowl and she is sometimes hand fed.

This sweet love is the most affectionate girl! She loves to cuddle and be near people. She will take any and all attention she can get. Susie loves going for walks and has even learned how to go up and down a few steps. She loves to lay in the grass and soak up the sun, but only when the temperature is not too hot.

Don't tell Susie she is different from other dogs. She has no idea she has some special needs. This loving girl desperately needs a home to call her own, one that is patient and willing to give her an extra hand when needed. In return, she will provide so much love and joy. And don't forget the snuggles.





KITTEN RESCUE AT T-MOBILE ARENA
