Upon arrival, our dog coordinator, Amy, was greeted with the chaos of frightened dogs living in a confirmed biohazard situation. Due to the severe odor and sheer amount of items hoarded in this home, it was impossible to enter. The dogs had to be lured outside and befriended slowly before they built up enough trust to allow her to perform an assessment. High summertime temperatures change the process of a multiple dog rescue. Our fosters are spread throughout the valley, so transporting two at a time was necessary to ensure the safety of these scared pups in the summer heat. Can you imagine what they must have been thinking as some of their friends were taken away?





LVVHS has provided medical care, including much needed dentals and vaccines, to these sweet pups as they entered our adoption program. They are now fully vetted and doing well in foster homes. So far, two of these adorable pups has been adopted. The next step in their journey is choosing their new family and forever home. Things are looking up!

This meant taking just one and going back the next day for the final dog. Amy returned to the home the next morning determined to rescue the last pup. After several hours of coaxing and patience, little Sable was rescued!
