Letter from the President

I need your financial help to allow the LVVHS to continue to rescue and adopt out homeless animals, and to continue to provide no cost/low cost spays and neuters for both owned animals and feral cats. The Las Vegas Valley Humane Society is a local organization, an all volunteer organization that serves local animals. Do you know that two nationally known organizations now have paid staff members here? And they are less about helping local animals than getting the national's name out there to solicit funds? Do you know that one of them told a Nevada Legislative hearing that they had 93,000 members in Nevada? Do you know that the State Humane Association of California filed a complaint against a national organization with the California Office of the Attorney General alleging "unfair and deceptive fundraising practices which harm local humane societies and SPCAs? ("Animal People," June 2011)."

What I really need is for each of you to look at the organizations that you are donating to and ask yourself these questions: Are you donating to an organization because the name sounds good or because you checked out the IRS Form 990 and it is spending the money on the animals and not on big salaries for its executive staff and public relations? Are you donating to an animal organization whose headquarters are in Washington or New York or to an organization that is local? Are you donating at local pet supply stores because it's easy? A good chunk of that money goes to administrative fees and out of state. My suggestion to you is to check and find out how much of that organization's budget is pledged to animals in Nevada, and particularly Southern Nevada; www.charitynavigator.org and www.guidestar.org are good sites for this.

The Las Vegas Valley Humane Society is the best organization for your donation. Check out our 990 online for both 2008 and 2009 at www.lvvhumane.org. As soon as the 990 is available for 2010, it will also go online. If you want a copy of our last audit, please email LVVHS@cox.net. Please attend our fundraisers on July 29th and September 30th and send us your donation in the enclosed envelope. I will make sure it is put to good use for local animals!

running away from anyone who would approach her. She just sat in the place where her owners had dumped her. LVVHS finally caught her in a humane trap. After weeks of grime were washed away, we found a cute 7.9 pound Dachshund Chi-x with a great personality. Lucy was soon adopted.

Her new owner wrote us this update: Lucy is very happy in her new home. She's a smart girl who wants to have all the toys in her new bed. She gets as many in as she can and then wiggles down in the middle. She has my shoe in there, too. She doesn't chew on it, she just wants to have it. We went to the vet today and she has a clean bill of health. This picture speaks for itself. On the right is her new sister and they are great friends as I know they would be.



Sadie is one of our greatest rescue success stories. As an eight year old dog, she was pushed out on her own with a tag on her collar that said, "Please help. Owner Lost Home." It was clear that Sadie had been used to fending for herself and had a few battle scars to prove it. LVVHS addressed her dog aggression problems with professional training to make her adoptable. Sadie was then adopted by a loving home.

Felony Cruelty and Breeders' Permit Legislation Signed Into Law!

SB223 Cooney's Law which provided for a felony in certain intentional and malicious acts of cruelty along with SB299-the Breeders' Bill which establishes a permit process for commercial breeders were signed by the Governor. Thanks to all of you who emailed and called your representatives asking them to support these bills. It made a difference. Senators Breeden, Parks, and Manendo sponsored SB223 and Senator Manendo sponsored SB299. Thanks also to Senator Roberson, who showed up at the Assembly hearing in support of SB223 along with Senators Breeden and Manendo. Gina Griesen, who authored SB223, Stacia Newman who helped pass SB299 with her depiction of the disgusting kennel in Amargosa, helped by video by Darcy Spears of Channel 13, and Beverlee McGrath, a lobbyist for multiple animal groups, also should be thanked for their efforts.

One other victory was the defeat of AB329 which would have limited water rights for wild horses. Once again our thanks to the Senate Natural Resources Committee and especially Senator Manendo who allowed all of the horse advocates to have their say. In addition, AB322 which made some changes in the conservation member who sits on the Nevada Wildlife Commission and allowed the Governor to appoint the director of Wildlife Services has already had some impact. A new conservation member has been appointed to the Nevada Wildlife Commission by the Governor, removing an existing member.

Other legislation was less successful. SB364-the horse tripping bill did not pass out of Committee. The passage of SB226, the trapping bill, was dramatically changed in the Senate Natural Resources Committee by Senator John Lee with the responsibility of procedurally dealing with proposed changes going back to the NV Wildlife Commission.
